# BAIL TO JAIL: STREET LEVEL DRUGS COURSE SYLLABUS T, Th 7:30 Fall 2022

#### **DESCRIPTION:**

The goal of this course is to provide students with a sophisticated understanding of Street Level Drug offenses from investigation through trial and post-trial relief. The course will focus on prosecuting and defending Street Level Drug cases and the ongoing scourge of the opioid crisis in Massachusetts.

#### **GRADING:**

- Students will be graded on a number of in-class presentations which may include: bail arguments; arguments associated with a motion to suppress; motions to dismiss; motions in limine; and, opening statements/closing arguments. 25% of grade.
- Students will have a final exam during final exam week which will include a mix of multiple choice and essay questions. **75% of grade.**
- Students will be expected to spend a morning or afternoon observing at Lawrence District Court. Lawrence District Court has jury trials Monday through Thursday in Courtroom

## Part One:

- The Arraignment:
  - 1. The investigational stage.
  - 2. The charges: Possession; Possession with intent to Distribute; Distribution; Trafficking. Additional time will be spent on OUI Drugs offenses and Manslaughter by overdose. (A discussion of the elements associated with each offense and the sentences proscribed by law).
  - 3. Understanding and interpreting criminal records
  - 4. The request for bail. (Students will be required to make bail arguments)
  - 5. Sample Police Reports. (How do these types of cases typically present themselves; hand to hand transactions; the use of confidential informants).

### **Part Two:**

- The Discovery Phase:
  - 1. What needs to be accomplished on Pretrial Hearing and Compliance and Election dates. (This will include the discovery requirements of Rule 14 of the Massachusetts Rules of Criminal Procedure.)
  - 2. Obtaining the drug certificate and lab file folder with chain of custody documentation.
  - 3. Notifying the opposing party of all witness information.
  - 4. Common roles of expert witnesses.
  - 5. In what circumstances must the Commonwealth provide the identity of a Confidential Informant?
  - 6. Students to prepare and respond to sample pretrial conference reports.

  - 1. The Origins and Purpose of the Exclusionary Rule
  - 2. Overview of the 4<sup>th</sup> amendment and Article 14
  - 3. Filing Requirements
  - 4. Standing: Defendants have no standing to suppress drugs found on buyers if they have been charged with Distribution. (Exception: Target Standing)
  - 5. What types of issues are typically raised in Street Level Narcotics Cases:
    - i. Invalid Stop

- ii. Invalid Exit Order
- iii. Lack of Probable Cause to Arrest
- iv. Invalid Motor Vehicle Search
- v. Search Warrants
- vi. Plain View Seizures
- vii. The Inventory Search
- viii. Statements (voluntariness and Miranda)

  - 2. Chemist must testify pursuant to Melendez-Diaz. See also the use of substitute chemists
